A regular meeting of the Mayor and Council of the Borough of West Long Branch was held on the above date and time in the Council Chambers, Borough Hall, 965 Broadway, West Long Branch, N.J.

Mayor Janet W. Tucci presided.

Mayor Tucci reported that in accordance with N.J.S.A. 10:4-6 adequate notice of this meeting of the Mayor and Council has been provided.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

Councilman Bray moved the approval of the minutes of the January 1, 2019, reorganization meeting. Seconded by Councilwoman Mango and carried upon the following roll call vote:

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES:

Mayor Tucci welcomed three 9th grade students from the Communications High School who were in attendance this evening.

Councilman Bray reported that the Finance Committee proposed having a special meeting for the purpose of discussing the 2019 budget on Tuesday, January 29th, at 6:00 PM. The Committee requested that the following departments be invited to attend the special meeting to review and answer questions concerning their budgets: Police, Fire, Emergency Medical Services, Public Works, and Recreation Commission. Further, he stated that it was anticipated that department budget requests would be posted in Dropbox for the Mayor and Council's review by the end of this week.

Councilman Bray advised that Ashlesha Deshpande, the Tax Collector, and Chris Ann Degenaro, the Registrar and full-time Office Personnel, both started in their new positions.

Councilman Bray stated that the Borough has negotiated a renewal of the shared service agreement with the City of Long Branch for the provision of IT Services, which will be on for approval at the next meeting. He expressed the Borough's pleasure with the level of service in this area.

Councilman Bray reported that the Borough has joined six other Monmouth County municipalities to permanently finance unfunded ordinances and Bond Anticipation Notes through The Monmouth County Improvement Authority ("MCIA"). The Borough was able to achieve an extremely attractive 2.839% cost of funds for its thirteen year financing. The MCIA bonds were sold at a net premium to investors, which generated \$543,786.15 of premium proceeds for the Borough that was used to cover costs of issuance and to borrow less. Savings realized by the Borough attributed to the Aaa/AAA/AAA credit rating provided by the County were \$102,431.49 net of the guaranty premium paid to the County. The value of the Monmouth County guaranty generates the lowest borrowing costs in the bond market.

Councilman Cioffi reported that he met with the Emergency Services Records Administrator, the Fire Chief, and the Assistant Fire Chief over the past couple of weeks. He also met with the Emergency Medical Services Captain and

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Line Officers. During these meetings, Councilman Cioffi was able to learn what their jobs entailed and their current recordkeeping and purchasing systems. They also discussed items of interest that they worked on in 2018 and their plans for the current year. Next he stated that he would be meeting with his Committee to communicate the information he has gathered.

Councilman Cioffi reported that the Fire Department responded to 29 calls for service during the month of December. Out of that number, 15 were false alarms. Both companies totaled 47 man hours.

Councilman Cioffi reported that the Emergency Medical Services were dispatched to 111 calls. Out of that number, 9 calls were referred to mutual aid towns to answer and 8 of them were canceled. Also, he announced the EMS and Fire Department officials implemented a new policy whereby EMS would be dispatched to working fires, gas/CO leaks/alarms with reported symptoms, all rescue assignments, excluding elevator rescues, all reported Haz-mat incidents, and when requested by the on-scene incident fire commander.

Councilman Migliaccio commented that Councilman Cioffi had made more headway with the Fire Department and Emergency Medical Services in three weeks than had been made in three years.

Councilwoman Mango reported that the Environmental and Shade Tree Commissions held their reorganization meetings this month.

Councilwoman Mango welcomed Debbie Ronan as the new Chair of the Recreation Commission. The Commission met and discussed the following events for 2019:

- Easter Egg Hunt – Saturday, April 20th, at 10:30 AM
- Fishing Derby – Saturday, June 8th
- Summer Recreation Program – Starts Monday, June 24th, at Shore Regional High School
- Summer Concerts – Friday, July 19th, and Friday, August 9th
- Fall Festival – Sunday, October 20th, from 1:00 PM to 4:00 PM
- Tree Lighting – Saturday, December 7th
- Menorah – December 22nd through December 30th

The Borough Clerk was asked to e-mail the above dates to the Mayor and Council.

Councilwoman Mango mentioned that the Environmental Commission was still investigating the complaints regarding bamboo.

Councilman Migliaccio had nothing to report this evening.

Councilman Neyhart had no Police Report for this evening.

Councilman Neyhart announced that the annual personnel awards would be presented at the February 20th meeting.

Councilman Neyhart stated that this year's Fishing Derby was scheduled for June 8th.

Councilman Neyhart invited everyone to a football watch party sponsored by the West Long Branch Community Center on Sunday, February 3rd, starting at 2:45 PM. He commented that there would be food and beverages and the cost was \$20 per person.

Councilman Penta reported that the Public Works Department has assigned two crews to fill potholes, including on Saturdays, in an attempt to stay on top of the problem.

Councilman Penta stated that the Public Works Department is prepared for the forecasted snow.

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The Borough Clerk reported that she was in receipt of a check in the amount of \$29,661.42 for the 2016 Recycling Tonnage Grant.

The Borough Clerk reported that the four police vehicles, one fire vehicle, and one EMS vehicle authorized for sale were sold through GovDeals.com for a total of \$11,071, minus GovDeals.com fee of \$830.31, for a net payment to the Borough of \$10,240.69.

The Borough Administrator stated that a new Public Works Laborer started working on Monday. Further, she reported that there were some interviews scheduled to fill another vacancy.

The Borough Attorney had nothing to report.

The Borough Engineer stated that the Borough was waiting for the Community Development Block Grant Program Project Agreement, in the amount of \$112,243, for various ADA sidewalk ramp improvements.

The Borough Engineer anticipated that the Maryland Avenue improvement project would be rebid in time for work to begin in March/April.

COMMUNICATIONS:

The Borough Clerk reported that she posted a brochure in Dropbox from Rutgers Center for Government Services for two program offerings for elected municipal officials entitled "The Powers & Duties of the Municipal Governing Body." She noted that sessions were scheduled for Wednesday, March 13th, and Saturday, May 18th.

Notice is hereby given that on November 15, 2018, New Jersey-American Water Company, Inc. (“Company”) filed with the Board of Public Utilities, pursuant to N.J.S.A. 48:2-21 and N.J.A.C. 14:9-7.1, *et seq.*, a petition seeking to increase rates for water and sewer service through revisions to the Purchased Water and Purchased Wastewater Treatment Adjustment Clauses (“PWAC” and “PSTAC”, respectively). The proposed rates would increase annual revenues by \$676,914 or 0.10%. The proposed change in rates provides no profits to the Company. The change merely represents a pass-through of charges to the Company from purveyors who supply water to the Company and from the cost of wastewater treatment services. Those wastewater treatment services are provided by the Ocean County Utilities Authority, the Cape May County Municipal Utilities Authority, and Howell Township.

The existing rates for GENERAL METERED, GENERAL SALES FOR RESALE, COMMODITY-DEMAND, OFF-PEAK DEMAND, SERVICE TO OTHER SYSTEMS, PEAKING SERVICE, AND OPTIONAL INDUSTRIAL WHOLESALE WATER CUSTOMERS served throughout the State of New Jersey, are proposed to be adjusted as follows:

The purpose of this letter is to continue the Section 106 process per 36 CFR800.3; establish an agreed upon Area of Potential Effects and identify historic properties per 36 CFR800.4; propose participants of a public involvement plan per 36CFR800.2; and assess the effects of the proposed undertaking per 36CFR800.3 and .5.

SUMMARY. The New Jersey Department of Transportation seeks your concurrence on our finding of No Effect to Historic Properties by the proposed project.

Project Description

The purpose of the Intersection Improvement Program is to significantly reduce the frequency and severity of overall crashes and specific crash types occurring at intersections on the State highway system. These three intersections exhibit high crash rates, poor safety scores, and are ranked on the Safety Management System. The following describes the proposed work at each location.

Route 70/CR 623 (New Hampshire Avenue)

Upgrade 8-inch traffic signal heads to 12-inch traffic signal heads for better visibility, add 12-inch traffic signal heads on far right traffic signal mast arms. Re-wire to meet current standards, relocate overhead traffic signal heads on CR 623 approaches to have near side left overhead signal heads and far-side right overhead signal heads to meet current standards, relocate image detectors accordingly, add UPS to controller cabinet, increase length of amber and all red phases, construct ADA compatible ramps, landing areas and access to push buttons in the northwest and southwest quadrants and install pedestrian signal heads in the northwest and southwest quadrants. (see attached map detail)

Route 36/CR 537 (Broadway-Eatontown Blvd)

Lengthen the Route 36 auxiliary lane lengths (NB left lane, SB right lane) through the intersection to current standards within current roadway width by restriping, total replacement of intersection signalization, including: Upgrade 8-inch traffic signal heads to 12-inch traffic signal heads for better visibility, upgrade controller and meter cabinet installation to meet current standards, upgrade conduits, junction boxes, and wiring to meet current standards, relocate overhead traffic

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signal heads on Route 36 approaches to have a near-side left / far-side right layout to meet current standards, increase length of amber and all red phases, upgrade intersection lighting for new signal layout, revise curb ramps for new signal layout, install pedestrian signal heads and pushbuttons in all quadrants and both medians, install new crosswalks across Route 36 on the north side of the intersection and across CR 537 on the east side of the intersection. (see attached map detail)

US 1/Wooding Ave

Upgrade crash cushions at the ends of the median barrier, total replacement of intersection signalization, including: upgrade 8-inch traffic signal heads to 12-inch traffic signal heads for better visibility, upgrade conduits and junction boxes to meet current standards, install three new traffic signal head assemblies on the mast arms over right through lanes of Route US 1 Northbound and Southbound, modify existing signal pole mast arms at the northeast and southwest quadrants to install two traffic signal assemblies – one 3-head assembly for through movement on Wooding Avenue Eastbound and one 4-head assembly for lead left indicator from Wooding Avenue Eastbound traffic, increase length of amber and all red phases if possible within the limitations of the project, upgrade intersection lighting, install pedestrian signal heads in all quadrants, construct ADA compatible ramps, landing areas and access to push buttons in all quadrants, install crosswalks across Wooding Avenue on the west side of the intersection, construct sidewalk along Route US 1 Northbound from the beginning of the jughandle ramp from Route US 1 Northbound to “Stop” control (R1-1). Relocate existing signpost for new stop sign to ensure the “Do Not Enter” is visible to oncoming traffic. Install “One Way” signs to supplement the existing “Do Not Enter” signs at the jughandle terminals. (see attached map detail)

These improvements will be located within NJDOT’s existing Right-of-Way. Since this work is not all include on the current *List of Undertakings Which Have Limited or No Effect on Cultural Resources in New Jersey*, Section 106 consultation is required.

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Our Section 106 public involvement action plan is consistent with NJDOT's PIAP. The policy promotes an on-going public partnership through early, frequent and continuous consultation with the public by committing to public notification to the affected parties, citizen input in the identification of the solutions and dedication on part of NJDOT to make the public's input meaningful through information concerning cultural resources presented to the public and established organizations, such as historical societies, at every opportunities.

Delineation of the Area of Potential Effects (36CFR800.3)

Archeological APE

The Archeological APE will be the area of the proposed ground disturbance. The only ground disturbance will be within NJDOT R.O.W. and within the disturbed grassed shoulders.

Architectural APE

Review of available information, including the NJ Historic Preservation Office's website indicated that there are no historic properties or districts within or near the APE. Given the scope of the proposed undertaking and all work taking place within the disturbed grassed shoulder, no additional information and evaluation work will need to be conducted.

Identification of Historic Properties (36CFR800.4)

The State and National Registers of Historic Places does not list any historic properties within the proposed project limits. There is one archaeological grid located within the project limits near Route 70/CR 623 (New Hampshire Avenue EM180), but all work will be contained within the disturbed grass shoulder located within NJDOT R.O.W.

Assessment of Effects (36CFR800.5)

Effects Findings

The proposed intersection work is located in highly urbanized areas and or previously disturbed shoulders, therefore, no impact to archaeological or architectural resources are expected and no survey work is proposed. NJDOT concludes that the project as proposed will have *No Effect* to architectural or archeological resources within the proposed intersection locations.

Conclusion

The NJDOT believes that the Level of Effort is one of *reasonable and good faith effort to carry out appropriate identification efforts commensurate* with the proposed project, as stated in 36 CFR800.4(b)(1).

Due to the nature of the proposed project, the NJDOT concludes that the project will have **No Effect** to any archeological or architectural resources since no Historic Properties exist within the APE.

WHEREAS, prior to conducting aerial dispensing operations over a designated "congested area," the County is required, pursuant to Federal Aviation

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Administration Regulation (FAR Part 137.51), to secure prior written approval from the governing body of the political subdivision over which the aircraft is to be operated; and

WHEREAS, the Borough of West Long Branch is designated as a “congested area” by the Federal Aviation Administration and the County has requested that this governing body consent to its proposed aerial dispensing operations;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Borough Council of the Borough of West Long Branch as follows:

PUBLIC HEARING:

Vincent Lepore, 33 Ocean Terrace, Long Branch, commented on the following items:

- He expressed his support of setting a policy for public comments, including the requirement that the person state their name and address for the record. He noted that the City of Long Branch has a five-minute time limit for public comments and that the Monmouth County Board of Chosen Freeholders generally allowed five minutes also. He felt that two minutes was too short. The Borough Attorney stated that he would be preparing a resolution setting the policy for a three-minute time limit that could be extended to five minutes if necessary.
- He pointed out that if the pending marijuana legislation was adopted, municipalities would have 180 days to re-enact any ordinances that were already adopted.

Frank Scatuorchio, Lloyd Avenue, questioned the flight path of the helicopters using the heliport at Monmouth Park Corporate Center. The Borough Attorney advised him that the path generally follows the highway. Councilman Cioffi added that the pilot could change the flight path due to weather conditions.

There being no one else wishing to speak, on motion made by Councilman Neyhart, seconded by Councilman Bray, and carried unanimously, the meeting was adjourned at 8:06 PM.
